- 2008 C: <u>The Art of Racing in the Rain by Garth Stein</u>: A heart-wrenching but deeply funny and ultimately uplifting story of family.
 A: <u>The Girl With the Dragon Tattoo by Stieg Larsson</u>: A spellbinding amalgam of murder mystery, family saga, love story, and financial intrigue.
- 2009 C: <u>The Help by Kathryn Stockett</u>: three extraordinary women whose determination to start a movement of their own forever changes a town

- 2016 C: <u>Hillbilly Elegy by J.D.Vance</u>: is a passionate and personal analysis of a culture in crisis—that of white working-class Americans. A: <u>News of the World by Paulette Jiles</u>: An aging itinerant news reader agrees to transport a young captive of the Kiowa back to her people

- 2017 C: <u>Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine by Gail Honeyman</u>: Is about the importance of friendship and human connection.
 A: <u>The Ninth Hour by Alice McDermett</u>: the story of a widow, her daughter and the nuns who serve their Irish-American community in Brooklyn.
- 2018 C: <u>An American Marriage by Tayari Jones</u>: A moving portrayal of the effects of a wrongful conviction on a young African-American couple
 A. <u>The Overstory by Richard Powers</u>: is a impassioned work of activism and resistance that is also a stunning evocation of the natural world.
- 2019 C: <u>The Testaments by Margaret Atwood</u>: the theocratic regime of Gilead maintains its grip on power, but there are signs it is beginning to rot.
 A: <u>The Dutch House by Ann Patchett</u>: explores the bond between two siblings, the house of their childhood, and a past that will not let them go.
